### Essays on “One Country, Two Systems”

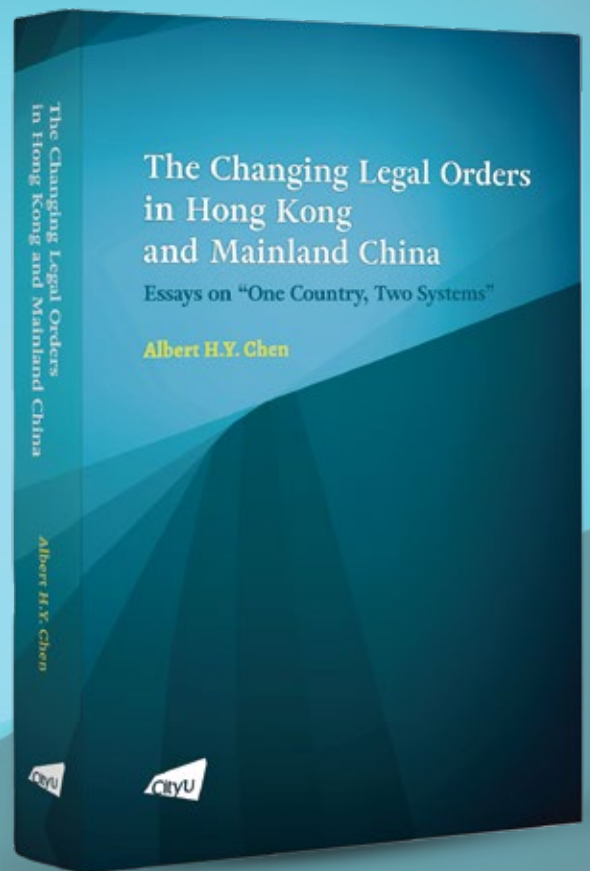
This collection of selected works by Professor Albert Chen shows the contours of the author’s scholarship as it developed over 35 years of his academic career, from 1984 to the present. The essays are divided into three sections which cover the three major domains of Professor Chen’s research.

**Part I** covers the legal developments and controversies of “One Country, Two Systems” since the Hong Kong interpretation on “the right of abode” in 1999 to the anti-extradition movement of 2019.

**Part II** shifts to focus on tradition and modernity in Chinese Law, including China’s Confucian and Legalist traditions and how the socialist legal system in China evolved and modernized in the era of “reform and opening”.

**Part III** examines the transplantation of Western thinking and constitutionalism to East Asia in modern times and discusses the achievements and failures of these efforts.

This collection exemplifies the author’s important contributions to the field and provides insight into how the legal orders in Hong Kong and mainland China have changed over the course of Professor Chen’s academic career.

Albert H.Y. Chen (陳弘毅) was born in and grew up in Hong Kong. In February 1984, Chen began his academic career as a Lecturer in Law at the University of Hong Kong. He taught the subjects of legal system and legal method, constitutional law, administrative law, law and society, jurisprudence, the legal system of the People’s Republic of China, Rule of Law in modern China, research methodology, and the use of Chinese in law.

Professor Chen is currently a member of the Hong Kong Basic Law Committee under China’s National People’s Congress Standing Committee (NPCSC) (a position which he has held since 1997) and a Justice of the Peace. He

is an honorary professor at several universities in mainland China and a member of the Academic Advisory Committee of the Institute of Law of the Academia Sinica, Taipei. He is also Associate Editor of *Hong Kong Law Journal* and a member of the editorial or advisory boards of several other journals published in Hong Kong.

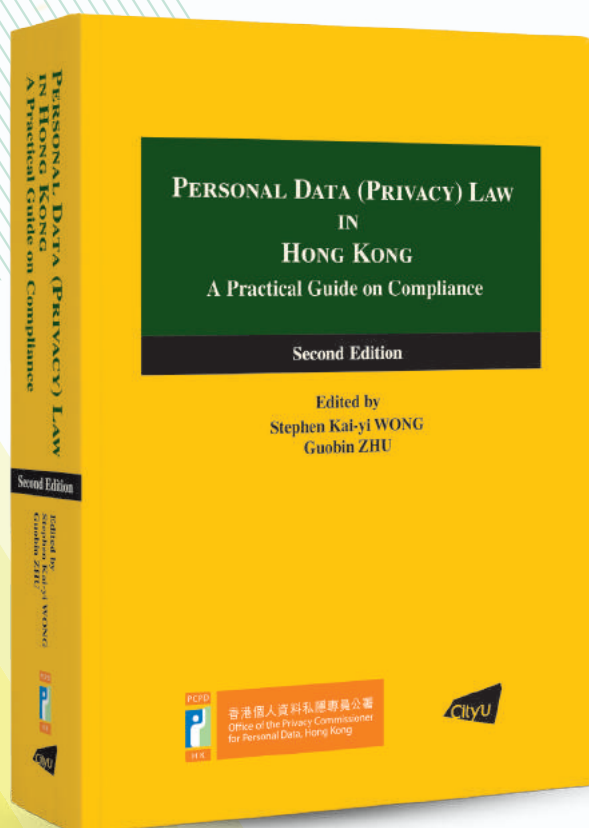

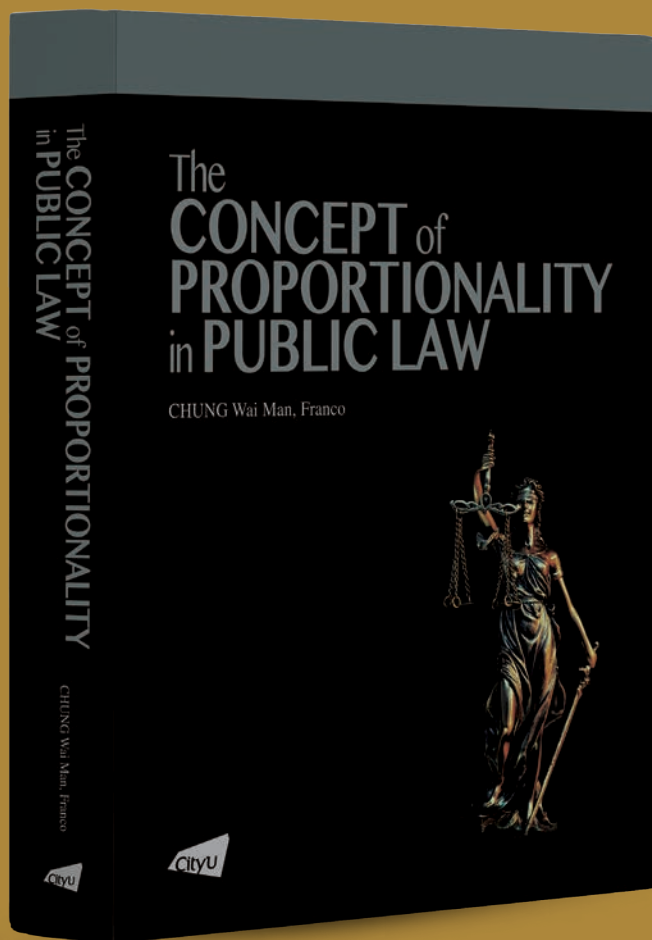
