

CONSULTATION ON REGULATION OF DISPOSABLE PLASTIC TABLEWARE

THE LAW SOCIETY'S SUBMISSIONS

The Law Society has reviewed a consultation paper by the Environmental Protection Department ("EPD") on *Schemes on Regulation of Disposable Plastic Tableware* issued on 9 July 2021 ("Consultation Paper").

Our responses to the questions in the Consultation Paper, save and except those for Questions 7 and 10 thereto, are set out in the completed Response Formⁱ attached to this paper.

For <u>Question 7</u>, i.e. "Do you agree that the ban on the provision of the following disposable plastic tableware by catering premises to customers for takeaway services should be imposed in phases?", we respond and state that

- (a) we do NOT agree that the ban should be implemented in phases;
- (b) we consider that all the measures proposed in the Regulation Schemes should be implemented by the date the EPD now proposes for Phase One i.e. in around 2025;
- (c) bans should be imposed on
 - (i) EPS tableware, straws, stirrers, cutlery (such as fork, knife and spoon) and plates by catering premises to customers for takeaway;
 - (ii) plastic cups, lids and containers and cutlery by catering premises to customers dining in as well as to customers for takeaway, unless there is a recyclable alternative; and
- (d) provision of recyclable cutlery or charging for single use EPS takeaway cutlery should seriously be considered as we do with plastic bags.

For Question 10, i.e. "Do you have any other opinions on the "Scheme on Regulation of Disposable Plastic Tableware" and other relevant issues?", we state that any policy formulated should be sensitive to needs of different sector / groups in the community, given that the implementation of the policy (to be formulated) would have implications upon the habits and the livelihood of Hong

Kong people. One example is construction workers working outdoors not having cutlery for eating takeaways.

By way of passing remarks, we are quite disappointed with the Consultation Paper, as the questions posed therein are not too helpful in formulating a policy on reducing plastic wastes. Some questions seem to be self-serving, in that they only yield answers which must be obvious (e.g. Question 3 – *Do you agree that the sale of disposable EPS tableware to local end-consumers (including catering premises) should be banned?* - when the Consultation Paper clearly alludes to "the serious potential impacts of EPS tableware on global marine ecosystem" (para 3.5 thereof). We do not consider that any sensible respondent who has read the Consultation Paper would opt for "no" or "strongly disagree" to answer this question). Question 6 is another example.

Other questions are (with respect) too general, without in-depth analysis on issues that could possibly arise from the proposed bans, e.g. we expect viability of and availability of any alternatives to the EPS tableware, and the financial impact upon the community of using these alternatives (if available), be more meaningfully canvassed in the Consultation Paper. The impact of these alternatives on our environment should also be raised. We anticipate that if legislation is the way forward (and we strongly agree that that is the case), the issues to be considered in the legislation, and the time-tabling of the legislation exercise, should be laid out and be explained to the public.

In our views, irrespective of any legislation to be enacted on the matter, there should be a fundamental change to the habit of using and disposing of disposable tableware. Education on the use of recyclable disposable tableware is a must.

We note the EPD has carried out and has tabulated various researches on Plastic Control Policies in various regions (see page 23 of the Consultation Paper). These are helpful in the discussion of the above issues and should be elaborated for the public.

One matter which in our view has not been covered in the consultation is the position in the Region. E.g. according to our desk research, the National Development and Reform Commission of Mainland China released a schedule/blueprintⁱⁱ on tackling plastic pollution on 16 January 2020. It plans to prohibit the production, selling and use of single-use disposable plastic products separately step by step in 2020, 2022 and 2025. Some major cities in the Mainland China have embraced policies to completely prohibit the production and sale of plastic tableware, reportedly in late 2020ⁱⁱⁱ (depending on the types of plastic tableware, the prohibition would be implemented in some cities in phases). Additionally, it was also reported that Mainland China will prohibit the import of plastic waste in 2025^{iv}. The above developments seemingly are relevant to the question as to whether and if so how the environmental policy of the Hong Kong SAR under consideration in this consultation should (or should not) correlate to the above.

The United Nation's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change has on about 9 August 2021 issued a "Code Red" on the fast-rising global temperatures. Hong Kong SAR should contribute its efforts to help save the environment and avoid climate change the trend of which has been described as a "catastrophe".
